Free app helps youth reach out to mental health and addiction services in Hamilton

St. Joseph's Healthcare Hamilton's Youth Wellness Centre sponsored Hamilton's version of *Be Safe*, a free app launched for Apple and Android mobile devices in June. The app aims to help youth manage mental health crises and reach out to local mental health and addiction services.

Be Safe was originally developed by mindyourmind in London, Ontario, with the support of a dedicated team of youth, the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health's (CAMH) Provincial System Support Program and other partners in the Systems Improvement through Service Collaboratives initiative. The success of the London-specific version of Be Safe sparked interest in other communities across the province who partnered with mindyourmind to develop their own community-specific mental health and addiction resource listings.

The Hamilton version of *Be Safe* was coordinated by CAMH's Hamilton office with support from St. Joe's Youth Wellness Centre. It guides youth through developing a personal safety plan for use in mental health crises and walks them through a series of questions. The app provides a list of local Hamilton resources to reach out to including, St. Joseph's Healthcare Hamilton's Youth Wellness Centre, Alternatives for Youth, Crisis Outreach and Support Team, Living Rock and CONTACT Hamilton, just to name a few.

"In the middle of an upset or crisis it is hard to think clearly about what to do or who to call, but by using this app to plan ahead the guess work is cut out and help is only a few clicks away," explains Lisa Jeffs, Manager, St. Joseph's Healthcare Hamilton's Youth Wellness Centre. "Youth in Hamilton will be able to use this app to customize a safety plan for themselves that will be there ready for them in times of crisis and point them to local Hamilton crisis resources so they know exactly who to reach out to when they need help."

ames Fedirko is gearing up for another adventure. On Friday, August 21st he will cycle 500 km from Hamilton to Lions Camp Dorset, a summer retreat for kidney patients and their families. James' ride is in memory of Kimberley Leach. James was Kimberley's guardian angel in life. For 13 years he provided her with dedicated support during her dialysis treatment at St. Joseph's Healthcare Hamilton. Although Kimberley died in 2008, she lived seven years past her life expectancy due in part to the compassionate patient care that she received from James and his colleagues in Kidney and Dialysis Care at our Hospital.



St. Joseph's serves over two million people in South Central Ontario and is the clinical and academic lead in the region for kidney care. Patients living with chronic kidney disease will often have to visit our Hospital several times per week, for hours at a time for dialysis treatments. All funds raised through James'

ride will be donated to the Dialysis Program at St. Joe's and will be used to help make our dialysis patients more comfortable as they receive this life-saving treatment.

Research at St. Joe's SPONSORED BY ST. JOE'S

W ith the support of the Research Institute of St. Joe's Hamilton, the Professional Advisory Committee (PAC) & the Nursing Advisory Council (NAC) have established research award programs to support health professionals engaging in independent research activities at St. Joe's.

The groups receiving funding represent nurses and therapeutic staff such as Respiratory Therapists. Occupational Therapists, and Psychologists practicing at St. Joe's. The PAC & NAC strive to engage professional staff in improving clinical care, research and education across various disciplines.

The award funding provided by the Research Institute assists novice and experienced researchers in developing research initiatives, implementing pilot studies and integrating research results into clinical practice. Now in its second program, the award seeks to build upon its successes from last year's projects and continue to transform care at St. Joe's.

One research project is evaluating whether or not a collaborative, team-based nursing model of care delivery improves patient care outcomes within our inpatient units. By measuring patient length of stay, nurse sensitive outcomes, patient satisfaction, staff engagement and other metrics, this study has the potential to improve the way care is delivered to the patients that we serve.

Another research project seeks to determine the effectiveness of Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) as a treatment for irritable bowel syndrome. Not only does the project seek to evaluate whether or not CBT improves quality of life and reduces symptoms, but it also aims to increase our understanding of the effects of CBT on gut bacteria in this patient group.

"These research awards help to fund innovative and exciting research studies at St. Joe's," states Dr. Matilda Nowakowski, clinical psychologist. "Without research funding, we can identify research ideas but we won't always be able to make them a reality."

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Spotlight on Library Services

Referencing and Citation Management Tools

citation manager helps you keep track of articles, books, and other materials as you find them, tag and annotate them and create citations and bibliographies. Since access to RefWorks through McMaster is ending on August 15, 2015 many of you will be searching for a new citation manager. There is no shortage of choices out there but some seem to be more popular than others. Choosing which research/citation manager works best for your needs can be a process of trial and error. Consider the following when deciding:

- Format web based or stand alone? Does it sync across devices?
- Cost some are free but charge for extra storage
- Learning curve or user support
- Importing and organizational capabilities
- How does the manager interact with PDFs and Websites?
- Integration with word processing software to add footnotes & in sentence citations

If you're willing to pay for your citation manager then **RefWorks, Papers** or **Endnote Web** are popular choices. If free is your choice McMaster University has put together a chart comparing 3 free tools (Mendeley, Zotero, & Endnote Basic), to view visit:
