Congratulations to Dr. David Higgins who has recently been appointed President of St. Joseph's Healthcare Hamilton (SJHH).

Dr. Higgins has held multiple roles at SJHH, currently serving as Chief of Staff. He is Clinical Professor of the Department of Medicine in the DeGroote School of Medicine and is an accomplished Respirologist practicing in our Firestone Institute for Respiratory Health.

During his career at SJHH, Dr. Higgins has also been a member of the Internal Medicine Service and an attending physician on the Clinical Teaching Unit for 14 years. His other specialty clinical work has focused on Respirology clinical service and outpatient care with a special interest in sleep medicine. Known to be a strong believer in the critical role of interdisciplinary care, Dr. Higgins has always worked closely with colleagues in nursing, allied health and management. Dr. Higgins received his undergraduate medical training in Ireland and was trained in Internal Medicine and Respirology in Ireland, the UK and Canada. Following fellowship training at St. Joseph's and McMaster University, he practiced Internal Medicine, Respirology and Intensive Care Medicine in the Sudbury Hospital system. New Portering program to enhance the patient experience

It is with great anticipation that Environmental Services and SJHH leadership are proud to announce the impending release of a new web-based system, called "Transport", that will support both porters and requestors during busy times. This system is scheduled to be launched at 7:00 a.m. on January 12th, 2010.

While help with busy-time support is a key benefit of the new system, the initiative supports the hospital's key focus on patient safety, including the "one hour bed turnaround" goal, reduced wait time for admitted patients, improved patient flow, and the general improvement to the patient experience through the seamless integration of automation.

Requestors (such as nursing, other clinical and hospital staff) will have the capability to create pre-booked porter requests that will result in a major time savings to requestors. The status of porter requests can be viewed online while they are in progress, and porters will be able to accept one or many stacked requests to streamline their workload. All of this will be accomplished through a simple web-based tool.

Environmental Services have planned several opportunities for hospital staff to learn about this new system prior to roll out. There will be instructor-led training for Super-Users, an information desk will be set-up outside the cafeteria during lunch hours, e-Learning will be distributed to the clinical staff, and unit-by-unit visits are already underway. Prior to roll-out, lunch 'n' learn sessions are planned for anyone to attend and learn more about the initiative. Post-implementation support is planned to help with the transition to the new service.

You will hear more from your managers in the coming days about this important and simple service improvement.

Helping to ensure a healthy start for newborns in our community

Sister Teresa Carmel began her career in 1944 at St. Michael's in Toronto where she worked as a Lab Technician for three years. In 1945, she moved to St. Joseph's in Guelph where she stayed until 1972. At this time, she moved on to manage the hospital's Pastoral Care Department until 1974 when she moved on to St. Joseph's Hospital in Hamilton, beginning her service in the hospital's Maternity ward in 1982. Much of her work involved providing pastoral services to the patients though she spent many hours organizing donations for needy families.

The staff of the St. Joseph's Maternal Child Program is delighted to have Sister Teresa as part of their team and look forward to her weekly visits to their department. "Sister brings a smile to the faces of our staff and simply loves to see the newborns," says Marnie Buchanan, Manager of the Maternal Child Program. Though she now visits only one morning a week, she can usually be found in her "office" organizing donated and bought baby items into boy and girl bundles. Each bundle usually consists of items such as diapers, knit sweaters, hats and booties, sleepers, receiving blankets and beautiful hand-knitted dolls. Bundles are always readily available whenever a family in need is



identified by the hospital's Social Work and Pastoral Care Departments.

Sister Teresa admits that she is an astute shopper, always looking for the best quality items at the most cost-efficient prices. "I prefer to buy the sleepers that come in four in a bag, and one piece outfits that are found in packages of six". Her frequent shopping trips usually take her to Zellers and Shoppers Drug Mart where she is also able to take advantage of her accumulated HBC and Optimum rewards points. She has received many donations over the years from many St. Joseph's Healthcare employees, including an annual financial gift from the St. Joseph's Volunteer Association. She is also fortunate to rely on the occasional gift-in-kind such as diapers from Pampers and bags (to hold the bundles) from G.T. French Paper Ltd. of Hamilton. Sister Teresa always acknowledges the gifts and donations that are received and logs each "thank you." Knowing the importance of recording all purchases and donations received, her records are kept meticulous and kept up-to-date.

"Sister Teresa brings a passion for giving to our program and our patients," says Marnie. "She always sees the good in others and helps to spread kindness throughout the team and to the patients that she serves."

Horizon Utilities awards SJHH for outstanding energy savings

On November 24th, 2009, St. Joseph's Healthcare was presented with a \$172,409 Energy Retrofit Incentive Program rebate cheque by Horizon Utilities in recognition of substantial electricity savings over the past year.

The hospital is in the midst of a \$9.3 million energy retrofit and renewal program with Honeywell Energy Solutions. By combining energy-efficient upgrades with critical building enhancements, the program is helping the Charlton and King Campuses address deferred maintenance, reduce their environmental footprints and save almost \$1 million in utility costs per year. We have already seen a 27% reduction in energy use since its implementation last year.

Dr. Julian Dobranowski appointed provincial diagnostic lead for Cancer Care Ontario

St. Joseph's Healthcare is pleased to announce that Dr. Julian Dobranowski, Radiologist and Medical Director of the Imaging Research Centre, has assumed the role of Program Head, Cancer Imaging Program, for Cancer Care Ontario (CCO) – bringing Diagnostic Imaging to the decisionmaking table for the first time.

This position is the inaugural placement of a Radiology lead into a clinical group at CCO. With clinical leads in Family Medicine, Surgery, Radiation Oncology and Medical Oncology, this will be the first year that CCO will have a lead in Diagnostic Imaging.



"This position has now allowed Radiologists to have a voice in how we enhance a patient's journey," says Dr. Dobranowski. "Radiology has an important role in every single aspect of patient care, whether from screening and initial diagnosis, to medical therapies, and even end of life cases. The CCO is driven by enhancing patient care, and that connects succinctly with SJHH's work and mission."

In his new role, Dr. Dobranowski will provide visionary leadership at the provincial level, looking at optimizing utilization and assisting with quality issues. Along with maintaining strong community relationships, Dr. Dobranowski will also be contributing to the development and implementation of the overall Ontario Cancer Plan and supporting the Development of the Regional Cancer Program.

"We are pleased that Dr. Dobranowski will provide his leadership as the inaugural program head for the province's Cancer Imaging Program," says Cancer Care Ontario President and CEO Terrence Sullivan. "Dr. Dobranowski's background makes him well-positioned for this new role where he will work with Diagnostic Imaging clinicians from across Ontario to enhance the quality of, and access to, screening, diagnosis and treatment planning for cancer patients. His work will also support on-going advancement in this important area."

The CCO role will be part-time for three years, with Dr. Dobranowski maintaining his current clinical and administrative roles at St. Joseph's.

"A bulk of the work we do at St. Joseph's Healthcare is cancer-related already," adds Dr. Dobranowski. "It therefore links well with the patient-centric mantra that Cancer Care Ontario believes in."

December is Code Yellow month. The purpose of a Code Yellow is to alert staff that the location of an adult patient, visitor, or healthcare worker (HCW) is unknown. It is important to note that in the context of the Code Yellow policy, an HCW includes any employee, contract worker, learner, physician, volunteer or contractor. The goal of the Code Yellow policy and procedure is to provide all staff and security personel with direction for assisting in determining the location of the missing person and their safe return.

Well on our our way to enhancing surgical care in our community



The Perioperative Redevelopment Project is a SJHH "own funds" project which will be completed in the fall of 2011. Numerous Perioperative teams have been working diligently since 2007 to plan for an efficient, patient-centred, modern surgical centre that will serve the Hamilton community well into the future. Once completed, the new Perioperative Surgical Program will include 12 new state-of-the-art OR suites, space for 25 PACU (Recovery) and 50 DSU (Day Surgery) beds and a new Sterile Processing Department (SPD) to support the entire organization.

Construction is well underway, as evidenced by the September installation of the construction crane in the excavated area adjacent to the

Emergency Department. This crane will lift construction materials into the site until the end of May, 2010. Work on level 0, in the location of the future new SPD has been ongoing for many months, and includes demolition of existing space, reinforcement of existing supporting columns, unearthing to accommodate future elevator shafts and subsequent removal of soil.

A "Red Carpet" event was held on October 21st for Perioperative staff to review the final plans for their new area and to get a "glimpse of the future" via the architectural images representing the vision for this new area.

New 1-800 number ensures safest use of medications

Dr. Mitchell Levine, Director of the Centre for Evaluation of Medicines at St. Joseph's Healthcare, recently lead the development of a medication consultation service to support healthcare providers. This new service now eliminates the need for patients to travel to an in-person clinic, and provides an opportunity for consultation within 72 hours. This is a service that will benefit patients, physicians, and pharmacists in creating a more efficient way for dealing with medication consultation issues.

Initially, a clinical pharmacist obtains the relevant clinical information regarding the problem or concern. Subsequently, a physician-clinical pharmacologist will provide a consultation response in the form of both a telephone conversation and written (fax or secure e-mail) report to the referring healthcare provider.

Prior to this "virtual" clinic, patients were referred to a clinic in the outpatient department at St. Joseph's, where the availability of the consultant physicians constrains access to the clinic. As well, travel to the clinic was an issue for some patients across the region who did not reside in Hamilton. This new service will now eradicate these limitations.

"The intent of this project is to provide helpful information to practicing physicians and assist in the safe use of medications for their patients," says Dr. Levine. "This is a therapeutic clinic that we hope will reduce patient morbidity and the need for healthcare services arising from medication-related clinical problems."

Undesirable effects from medications are an issue that many patients and healthcare institutions deal with on a daily basis. Currently, approximately 12% of emergency admissions are the result of medication-related problems that are preventable

Even the cashier at the coffee shop was friendly and outgoing.

After my examination, I was rather apprehensive upon realizing that I was too late to catch the next train back to London. Dr. Chaimowitz however quickly helped me figure out when the next one would arrive, which allowed me to make more reasonable travel arrangements home thereby preventing me from enduring what would have been almost a five hour wait at the train station.

I realize that when someone is visiting the hospital, it is usually under unfortunate circumstances, so I wanted to recognize your staff for going above and beyond to make the experience as pleasant as possible.
